The following is the Education Requirement from the NHBP Revenue Allocation Plan:

In order for an eligible Member between the ages of eighteen (18) and twenty-one (21) years of age to receive a per capita payment directly, such Member must submit to the Enrollment Office or Tribal Council, one of the following:

- **1** a copy of his/her high school diploma,
- 2 a copy of his/her degree or certificate equivalent to a high school diploma,
- 3 documentary proof of satisfactory completion of high school degree-equivalent home schooling requirements for the member's state of residence, or
- a certification from an accredited school or schools that the member has learning or other disabilities and has attended a full twelve years of school.

The appropriate diploma, degree, or certification must be submitted to the Enrollment Department before any particular eligible Member within this age group may have his/her per capita payment mailed to him/her. If such copy is not submitted in a timely manner, the per capita payment for such Members shall be deposited in the Member's minor trust account.

Elders Travel to W.K. Kellogg Bird Sanctuary

The NHBP Elders recently toured the W.K. Kellogg Bird Sanctuary in Augusta. They had a beautiful day on the trip to the Sanctuary learning about birds and the history of Kellogg — the same family legacy that makes the breakfast cereal.

The sanctuary is a part of Michigan State University, which conducts research Ecology, agriculture and natural resources education. The Elders enjoyed lunch in McCrary Dining Hall before the tour.

During the tour, the group began with the "Birds Of Prey" live presentation. Almost all of the birds at the sanctuary are injured and unable to live in the wild. The presentation

included some interesting facts about birds, including that birds have hollow bones, no teeth and often eat smaller animals. We saw various types of birds during the tour including the Barn Owl, Eastern Screech Owl, Great Horned Owl, Red-tailed Hawk and the majestic Bald Eagle.

Our tour guide, John, did a good job of leading the tour. The Elders also fed various types of swan at Wintergreen Lake. No Elders lost any fingers while feeding the aggressive swan.

After visiting the W.K. Kellogg Bird Sanctuary, the Elders were treated to ice cream.

Some of LAUNCH's objectives include collaboration, integration of care, and parent strengthening all with the foundation of the Social Emotional Development of children 0-8 years old.

Parent Tammi Huerta heard about the Early Childhood Fair weeks before it happened, but she knew right away that she wanted to take her children, Catalina, 9 months, and her two older sons.

"It was a really good experience for the kids," Huerta said, who added that going through the firehouse was the boys' favorite.

"I think this type of event is important because kids are constantly learning things," Huerta said. The tradition, the firehouse, the teachings where the kids got to be physicians and work on Elmo, the cops painted their faces, so they're building that trust — they're learning so much but they're also having a lot of fun."

Parent Samantha Wethington attended the fair with her 5-month-old daughter, Elliot and 5-year-old daughter, Harmony. Wethington said her children had plenty of fun and were educated.



One of NHBP Tribal youth Alan Mackety's dreams came true on June 12 during the FireKeepers Casino 400 Race at Michigan International Speedway.


Mackety was invited to wave the green flag just as the race began.

Appropriately named the FireKeepers Casino 400, NHBP Tribal Members who attended the June 12 race had a time they'll never forget.







NHBP Community Garden Update!

With the mid-point of the growing season upon us, the hard work of planting and caring for the community garden is starting to bear fruit. Early producing plants requiring cooler temperatures and a shorter growing season are now being harvested.

Extra produce is starting to arrive at the weekly Lunch & Learn events at Pine Creek Indian Reservation, and garden workers are also delivering fresh produce to shut-ins as it becomes available.

Wild Rice Program Expanding to Transplant Phase

The NHBP Wild Rice Program continues to flourish, and is in the process of moving from the investigative and monitoring phase to actually transplanting Wild Rice to the Pine Creek Indian Reservation.

Program educators say this is an important phase so the plant that NHBP ancestors depended upon for centuries can return as an important food for people and wildlife on the Reservation.

"You see, the origin of our story is here with us every day," said Contracted Wild Rice Specialist Lee Sprague. "Wild Rice is our migration story, and it goes right to the heart of who we are."

This year, the NHBP environment program has transplanted 766 Wild Rice seedlings to date in the Rice Pond and Pine Creek on the Reservation. All of the plants were in danger from being mowed down by homeowners and the V Drive Bridge construction project downriver of the Reservation.

This fall, seeds harvested from the plants will also be used to continue the Wild Rice restoration program on Pine Creek.

The Culture Department recently assisted finding the location for the transplants during a canoe trip down Pine Creek, to Nottawa Creek.

"Our Creation story, with the Turtle and the Muskrat, can be seen on most days on Pine Creek.

Our Migration story has us finding the place where the food grows on the water, our Potawatomi homelands," Sprague said. "It is always good to hear our creation and migration stories, especially on Pine Creek and Nottawa, where the turtle, muskrat and Wild Rice, are easily found," he added.

Tribal Members Charles Pfeifer, Kevin Harris Jr. and Langston Day have also been assisting Sprague, Match-E-Be-Nash-She-Wish, Potawatomi Tribal Member with the restoration efforts on Pine Creek, and learning to push-pole, and navigate, working off the canoes harvesting and transplanting Wild Rice shoots, or young Wild Rice plants.

Also, plans for an NHBP Wild Rice harvest are being discussed. This will be determined based on current harvest schedules and locations.

Vendor's Circle

Whether you were in the market for handmade soaps, skillfully hand crafted wood items, beaded or silver jewelry, or good ole' summertime Pow Wow food including the much coveted fry bread, the NHBP Pow Wow had it all.

Along the edge of the vendor's circle sat Native Blend of Port Huron, who sold herbal products and handmade soap; Bear Tracks of Brooklyn, who sold moccasins, blankets and T-Shirts; and Mandoka Native Crafts, whose owner, NHBP Tribal Elder Mike Mandoka, displayed various handcrafted pieces for sale.

Mandoka said he's been selling his pieces — including cedar medicine wheels, picture frames, and clocks — for about 10 years.

"This is about the only fair we do," he said of he and his wife, Janet Mandoka. I'm retired, and this is something that

I do, but I didn't want to make another job out of it."

Three NHBP Grand Entries

Nearly 100 people participated in each of the NHBP Pow Wow Grand Entries. From the Veterans Staff, to the Head Dancers, to the youth and children, many Members of various Tribes were dressed in Regalia.



Attention: New Health and Human Services Policy Update New Late/Missed Appointment Policy

Due to the high number of late arrivals and missed appointments, and the impact that it has on other patients waiting to see a service provider, the Health and Human Services Department has developed a late/missed appointment policy.

Late Arrivals:

If a patient arrives more than 15 minutes late for their scheduled appointment time, they may be rescheduled for a later date and time. If the patient is rescheduled for arriving more than 15 minutes late to their appointment it will be considered a "No Show" appointment.

Missed Appointments:

If a patient does not notify the Health and Human Services Department within 8 hours of their scheduled appointment time that they need to cancel, it will be considered a "No Show" appointment.

No Show:

After obtaining three "No Show" appointments for the same service, a patient will not be able to schedule an appointment with that service for three months. The patient will only be seen as a same day/walk-in patient if time permits.

Contract Health Services

Contract Health Services is funded through a grant from Indian Health Services. It is to help pay for medical services *not* offered through the NHBP Health Clinics.

What I should know:

- Contract Health is **not** a health insurance, it is a grant. Funds are limited and based on medical priorities.
- Contract Health does not guarantee payment.

Who is eligible for Contract Health Services?

- NHBP Tribal members living in the 7 county CHSDA; Allegan, Barry, Branch, Calhoun, Kalamazoo, Kent and Ottawa counties of Michigan.
- NHBP descendants under the age of 19.
- A non-Indian woman pregnant with an eligible Indian's child for the duration of her pregnancy through postpartum (6 weeks).

What will CHS pay for?

- CHS may help pay for medical/dental services outside of the NHBP Health Clinics if referred by one of NHBP's providers.
- ♦ Contract Health does not quarantee
 ♦ CHS may help pay for vision services.
 - ♦ CHS may help pay for prescriptions.

How do I get CHS to pay for these services?

- Provide notification through Contract Health prior to any service outside the NHBP Health Clinics.
- Notify contract health within 72 hours of an emergency room visit.
- Complete your CHS registration paperwork information yearly. A letter will be mailed to you when you need to update your information. If your yearly

- registration requirements are not met, you will **not** be approved for funding.
- Apply for Medicaid or alternate resources if you do not have health insurance when applying for Contract Health. If you need help applying for Medicaid, please call Chris Woodring at 616.514.3638.







Tribal Members needing legal assistance may be eligible to receive free legal assistance. To determine eligibility, please contact Michigan Indian Legal Services (MILS).

Issues may include (among others):

- Criminal matters
- Family law
- Housing-eviction from Tribal public housing
- Health care and welfare benefits
- Child welfare and ICWA
- Juvenile delinquency cases
- Per capita garnishment and attachment of per capita distributions
- Estate Planning
