The following is the Education Requirement from the NHBP Revenue Allocation Plan:

In order for an eligible Member between the ages of eighteen (18) and twenty-one (21) years of age to receive a per capita payment directly, such Member must submit to the Enrollment Office or Tribal Council, one of the following:

- 1 a copy of his/her high school diploma,
- 2 a copy of his/her degree or certificate equivalent to a high school diploma,
- 3 documentary proof of satisfactory completion of high school degree-equivalent home schooling requirements for the member's state of residence, or
- a certification from an accredited school or schools that the member has learning or other disabilities and has attended a full twelve years of school.

The appropriate diploma, degree, or certification must be submitted to the Enrollment Department before any particular eligible Member within this age group may have his/her per capita payment mailed to him/her. If such copy is not submitted in a timely manner, the per capita payment for such Members shall be deposited in the Member's minor trust account.

During their visit to the Community Garden on August 4 as part of the Elders Committee Meeting, one of the Elders mentioned it was like being in a candy store where you could simply pick whatever you wanted. Others didn't bother to talk but went right to work picking tomatoes, peppers and squash. All marveled at the large size of the plants, high volume of produce and lack of weeds in the well tended Community Garden.

Similar reactions were generated from Tribal Council during their visit the next day.

Council Treasurer Tony Day remarked that "this was the best garden I have ever seen and the Environmental Department hit a home run this year."

Council Chairman Jamie Stuck shook all of the gardeners' hands, including garden leader Wanda Norman, Quentin Mandoka, Alex Mandoka, Ritta Rouse and Langston Day. Charles Pfeifer and Cheyenne Fryling were not present for Chairman Stuck's heartfelt thank you.

As part of the tour on both days Wanda explained the garden design, plant selection and fact that the garden was entirely organic, with no chemical applications whatsoever. This makes for more work but also makes the most nutritious and toxin free form of vegetables.

Although the tomatoes brought the most visitors and harvesters, it was the 12 foot tall Indian corn that attracted the most comments, with people standing near it to look up and marvel at what was generally the tallest and healthiest corn they had ever seen. Environmental Director John Rodwan indicated that he thought the secret to this year's garden success was the six tons of manure applied to it and the hard work the job bank employees spent on the garden.

Plans are already being made for next year's community garden, which will include electricity and a state-of-the-art drip irrigation system. In addition, 2017 will bring a recycling facility to the north of the garden. Plans for the facility and next garden will be drawn up over the winter off season. Community input is welcomed and encouraged. A call or visit to the Environmental Center will work, but a visit to the community garden will work even better.

Laura Gonzalez Escallon, of La Hulpe, Belgium, played two of the most dominant rounds in Tour history to win the FireKeepers Casino Hotel Championship at the Battle Creek Country Club on Sunday, July 24.

The tournament was shortened to 36-holes due to a severe storm in the area. Play began at 7:30 a.m., but was halted at 9:25 a.m. to evacuate the course. Rain and lightning continued through the early afternoon and play never resumed.

Gonzalez Escallon lapped the field with rounds of 7-under, 65 on Friday and a new course record 8-under, 64 on Saturday to win her first Symetra Tour event at 15-under, 129. Her two-day total matches the Symetra Tour's 36-hole scoring record.

"It feels awesome, but it hasn't sunk in yet because I was just trying to focus on my round," said Gonzalez Escallon, who was at her host family's house off of hole seven when she got the news. "When I got the email, I called my mom and told her the good news because she has been waiting and it is late at home in Belgium. I'm really happy about the win."

Gonzalez Escallon, 25, earned the first-place check of \$15,000 and one of two spots in The Evian Championship, to be held September 15 to 18. Golfer Ally McDonald, who made a birdie on her final hole on Saturday of the championships, finished in second place to earn the second spot in The Evian Championship. McDonald finished at 9-under, 135 with a 69 on day-one and a 66 on day-two.

"It's amazing to get to go to Evian, it will be my first ever LPGA event and it is a major," Gonzalez Escallon said. "I also get to go home so that is a good thing. I was trying to find an excuse to go home and now I have one. I will go to Evian and then enjoy a week off at home and then fly back to finish the Symetra Tour season."

Gonzalez Escallon, who rarely sees her coach back in Belgium, said he might be on the bag at The Evian Championship. "He hasn't seen me compete in at least three years so it will be great for him to be there," Gonzalez Escallon said. "We've been working together for 12 years so I'm just excited that he gets to be part of it."

Gonzalez Escallon moves from 38th on the Volvik Race for the Card money list to 16th, with \$31,053 earned.

"My dream is to play on the LPGA, so it would be great to get into the top 10 instead of going through Q-School which is a really tough week," Gonzalez Escallon said. "If I can play good golf the rest of year, it would help going to the LPGA knowing I can play consistently."

Gonzalez Escallon put together one of the most impressive two rounds in tour history. She made 15 birdies against no bogeys and hit 32 of 36 greens in regulation and 25 of 28 fairways. Escallon also had the flatstick working attempting 27 putts on the Friday of the tour and 26 on the Saturday of the tour.

The former Purdue All-American and 2011-12 Big Ten Player of the Year picks up her first career win in her 53rd start. Gonzalez Escallon now has 11 top-10 finishes in three seasons on tour. She finished 23rd on the money list in 2014 and 35th in 2015.

McDonald moves up to second on the Volvik Race for the Card money list with her second place finish. She now has five top-10 finishes as a rookie and has earned \$71,728 in 12 starts.

The Power's On!

Waséyebek Development Company, LLC (WDC) and Skasgé Power (a subsidiary of WDC) are pleased to announce that the Pine Creek Reservation and FireKeepers Casino Hotel solar arrays are installed and fully functional! The installations are evidence of NHBP's and WDC's strategic initiative to participate in the renewable energy industry in a way that benefits the environment and the Tribe.

Skasgé Power, LLC, was originally formed by NHBP Tribal Council in 2011 and partnered with a company that held patents to a new, innovative solar/thermal panel design. The design ultimately proved to be non-viable, but Tribal Council held true to their word and moved Skasgé forward with their commitment to provide solar power to the Tribe and explore potential business opportunities in renewable energy. In 2014, ownership and management of Skasgé was transferred to the Tribe's newly formed economic development company, WDC, for evaluation. The primary mission was to finish the panel installations that had been started and determine the potential profitability of a solar company.

The Pine Creek array was completed in April 2015, and consists of 48 panels, which convert energy from the sun into electricity that is stored for use by the Pine Creek Community Center. In addition, the panels have a thermal component that also pre-heats water used in the Community Center and saves on energy bills. Since WDC began tracking the output of the system in April 2015, the array system has produced 17.5 Mega Watt Hours (MWh) of electrical energy, which is the equivalent of 665 trees planted! A total of 570 units of thermal energy (therms) has been produced in that same time period.

The FireKeepers (FKC) project, which is much larger and more complex, and consists of 10 arrays with approximately 48 panels each, was completed in April 2016. The FKC system also produces electricity and thermal energy. The electricity is used by the FireKeepers Casino Hotel and the thermal component preheats water used in housekeeping at the same location. Since April 2016, the system has produced 86.99 MWh of electrical energy, which is equivalent to 3,393 trees planted and a reduction in carbon dioxide gas of 59.98 tons! Another way to look at the power produced is that it could power 263,620 light bulbs for 24 hours. A total of 500 therms have been produced at FKC.


Both locations are exceeding predictions for electrical output. The thermal components of both arrays have not operated long enough to accurately measure performance against estimates at this time. Outputs are being tracked electronically and WDC plans to keep everyone apprised of the ongoing energy savings via the WDC & Skasgé websites (coming soon).


Due to pending U.S. and state political changes in the coming election year, and uncertainties surrounding the predictable positive economics of alternative energy, WDC has scaled back the operations of Skasgé. The plan forward is to explore niche markets requiring solar and to pause and evaluate a new direction that may involve other sources of renewable energy.

Congratulations to Tribal Council, Tribal Membership, WDC staff, Skasgé employees, contractors and suppliers for the successful completion of our renewable energy projects!

The Fire Hub Project Update

The Hub project, now called "The Fire Hub," was announced in June to Tribal Membership and the general public. This philanthropic endeavor seeks to stamp out hunger in the Battle Creek area through a number of ways. First, in the restaurant portion of the project, 80 percent of proceeds will be given out to local charity and fifty cents off of each meal purchased will go directly to charity.

The Fire Hub will also feature a food pantry that will help serve families in need with the help of the Food Bank of South Central Michigan. Lastly, on the several acres of land that the Fire Hub sits on, food will be grown for the local schools with the goal to provide them with fresh salad bars every day.

The Fire Hub project is well on its way. The outside of the building has been power washed and restored to its turn of the century glory. Demolition and reconstruction on the interior of the building has commenced and is moving along well.

FireKeepers Pit Stop Update

The FireKeepers Pit Stop will be a convenience store, gas station and car wash situated on the west end of the property to service Tribal Members and casino goers alike. The building will feature an upscale look with plenty of onthe-go food options for guests.

Construction is well under way for this project as well. The gas tanks are in the ground and both the structural portion of the gas station and car wash buildings are going up quickly. Very soon both buildings will be under their covered roofs and interior work can begin.

The Pit Stop will be overseen by Vice President of Facilities Jack DeMik, who has hired a new manager, Bridgett Ellis, to run the day-to-day operations. The FireKeepers Pit Stop is tentatively set to open the first week of November 2016.

Dacey's Taphouse Update

Dacey's Sports Bar is becoming Dacey's Taphouse this December! The old Dacey's structure will be removed and the new Dacey's will be re-built in what is now part of the Bingo room. This renovation is coupled with an expansion to the Poker Room, which will add additional seating for players.

Dacey's Taphouse will feature over 50 beers on tap, 140-seat restaurant with an additional 50 seats on the mezzanine overlooking the casino floor for private parties. The new Dacey's will also serve food for the first time, giving Tribal Members and the Battle Creek area another food and beverage venue to enjoy.

Construction has begun on the Poker room expansion with a new wall already in place. Moore Trosper Construction Company has also begun demolition in the Bingo area to make room for the new Dacey's. Dacey's Taphouse is tentatively set to open in mid-December 2016.



The Gathering of Potawatomi Nations held in Oklahoma

Citizen Potawatomi Nation in Shawnee, Oklahoma hosted this year's Gathering of Potawatomi Nations. The NHBP were astonished by how extensive their reservation was and the various cultural, athletic and entertainment activities planned for them. Around 100 Tribal Members, families and a few staff attended the Gathering held July 27 to 31.

There were a lot of events one could participate in, so you could keep yourself busy, including the language conference, basketball tournaments, along with volleyball tournaments and they even had bowling tournaments. One could go to the shooting range and practice for a while, or even do archery. They even had different restaurants where you could eat.

Many pavilions were set up making it easy for participants to purchase Potawatomi gear. Most of the kids hung out at the youth center where they would meet new friends while having fun playing games and eating.

The host Tribe also held many workshops attended by the Elders.

The Gathering of Nations Pow Wow, which was the main feature, had many different dancers along with drummers and singers. A Potawatomi Girls group gave the audience a mini concert right before grand entry. In addition to the dancers and singers, there were traditional teachings as well.

In addition to all the events one could participate in, there was also the hand drum contest, the singing contest, dancing contest, and the Potawatomi princess pageant.

NHBP, Tribal youth, Ofelia Zapata and her father, Arthur Zapata, took home the first place prize for the hand drum contest.

"As my eyes were shut, I sang loud and clear, hoping and wishing my dad and I would rock it!" O'felia Zapata said. "Standing on the stage in front of my own people has to be the strongest feeling you could ever have. Winning the hand drum contest is like winning your people's energy. It was awesome. I honestly couldn't do it without my dad's help."

A few of our Tribal Members, including Daniel Jacobs, competed in the dancing competitions.

"My first time dancing was when I was about six years old, so it's been nine years since the last time I danced, but it was my first time dancing in a competition," Jacobs said. "It felt really great being in the arena."

The language conference took a big role in the Gathering. This year's theme was "talk Indian." The Cultural & Historical Preservation Office, (CHPO), along with a few Tribal Members, attended the language conference which was held from Wednesday to Friday. They would listen to stories, learn the language and traditions, play ShiShiBe' (Potawatomi bingo) and eat good food.

Danielle Pfeifer, Administrative Assistant, went to Oklahoma for the language conference with CHPO to present "Overcoming Obstacles," and how that affects our community.

"Presenting at the 2016 Potawatomi Language Conference gave us the ability to reach a broader audience rather than our own community. Some of the obstacles our department faces are the same obstacles other Tribes face. Attendees were also able to provide helpful strategies during the question and answer segment of our presentation. Many thanks to Citizen Band of the Potawatomi for the opportunity to present at the Potawatomi Gathering."

Tribal Council also enjoyed themselves at the Gathering.

"Visiting the Historical Preservation Center was my favorite part of The Gathering. The tour provided me better insight into the history of the Potawatomis of the West post removal era," said NHBP Tribal Chairman Jamie Stuck.

Everyone really enjoyed The Gathering of Potawatomi Nation this year, and appreciated Citizen Potawatomi Nation for hosting a great gathering as well as Membership Services and Tribal Council for putting this together for them.

Attention: New Health and Human Services Policy Update New Late/Missed Appointment Policy

Due to the high number of late arrivals and missed appointments, and the impact that it has on other patients waiting to see a service provider, the Health and Human Services Department has developed a late/missed appointment policy.

Late Arrivals:

If a patient arrives more than 15 minutes late for their scheduled appointment time, they may be rescheduled for a later date and time. If the patient is rescheduled for arriving more than 15 minutes late to their appointment it will be considered a "No Show" appointment.

Missed Appointments:

If a patient does not notify the Health and Human Services Department within 8 hours of their scheduled appointment time that they need to cancel, it will be considered a "No Show" appointment.

No Show:

After obtaining three "No Show" appointments for the same service, a patient will not be able to schedule an appointment with that service for three months. The patient will only be seen as a same day/walk-in patient if time permits.

Contract Health Services

Contract Health Services is funded through a grant from Indian Health Services. It is to help pay for medical services *not* offered through the NHBP Health Clinics.

What I should know:

- insurance, it is a grant. Funds are limited and based on medical priorities.
- ♦ Contract Health does not quarantee
 ♦ CHS may help pay for vision services.

Who is eligible for Contract Health Services?

- ♦ NHBP Tribal members living in the 7 county CHSDA; Allegan, Barry, Branch, Calhoun, Kalamazoo, Kent and Ottawa counties of Michigan.
- ♦ NHBP descendants under the age.
- ♦ A non-Indian woman pregnant with an eligible Indian's child for the duration of her pregnancy through postpartum (6 weeks).

What will CHS pay for?

- ♦ CHS may help pay for medical/dental services outside of the NHBP Health Clinics if referred by one of NHBP's providers.
- ♦ CHS may help pay for prescriptions.

How do I get CHS to pay for these services?

- Provide notification through Contract Health prior to any service outside the NHBP Health Clinics.
- Notify contract health within 72 hours of an emergency room visit.
- ♦ Complete your CHS registration paperwork information yearly. A letter will be mailed to you when you need to update your information. If your yearly

- registration requirements are not met, you will **not** be approved for fundina.
- ♦ Apply for Medicaid or alternate resources if you do not have health insurance when applying for Contract Health. If you need help applying for Medicaid, please call Chris Woodring at 616.514.3638.

- Family law
- Housing-eviction from Tribal public housing
- Health care and welfare benefits
- . Child welfare and ICWA
- · Juvenile delinquency cases
- Per capita garnishment and attachment of per capita distributions
- Estate Planning

MILS attorneys are available to meet with NHBP Members either in the Grand Rapids Office or at the Government Center on the Pine Creek Indian Reservation – the schedule of office hours is posted on nhbpi.com.
