Contract Health Services

Contract Health Services is funded through a grant from Indian Health Services. It is to help pay for medical services *not* offered through the NHBP Health Clinics.

What I should know:

- Contract Health is **not** a health insurance, it is a grant. Funds are limited and based on medical priorities.
- Contract Health *does not* guarantee payment.

Who is eligible for Contract Health Services?

- NHBP Tribal members living in the 7 county CHSDA; Allegan, Barry, Branch, Calhoun, Kalamazoo, Kent and Ottawa counties of Michigan.
- NHBP descendants under the age of 19.
- A non-Indian woman pregnant with an eligible Indian's child for the duration of her pregnancy through post-partum (6 weeks).

What will CHS pay for?

- CHS may help pay for medical/dental services outside of the NHBP Health Clinics if referred
- by one of NHBP's providers.
 CHS may help pay for vision services.
- CHS may help pay for vision service:
 CHS may help pay for prescriptions.

Cho may help pay for prescriptions

How do I get CHS to pay for these services?

- Provide notification through Contract Health prior to any service outside the NHBP Health Clinics.
- Notify contract health within 72 hours of an emergency room visit.
- Complete your CHS registration paperwork information yearly. A letter will be mailed to you when you need to update your information. If your yearly

registration requirements are not met, you will **not** be approved for funding.

Apply for Medicaid or alternate resources if you do not have health insurance when applying for Contract Health. If you need help applying for Medicaid, please call Chris Woodring at 616.514.3638.

If you have recently graduated from high school, or received your GED from a certified test site, please send a copy of the document to the Enrollment Office. This information is used for per capita distributions.

The following is the Education Requirement from the NHBP Revenue Allocation Plan:

In order for an eligible Member between the ages of eighteen (18) and twenty-one (21) years of age to receive a per capita payment directly, such Member must submit to the Enrollment Office or Tribal Council, one of the following:

- 1 a copy of his/her high school diploma,
- 2 a copy of his/her degree or certificate equivalent to a high school diploma,
- Output the sector of satisfactory completion of high school degree-equivalent home schooling requirements for the member's state of residence, or
- a certification from an accredited school or schools that the member has learning or other disabilities and has attended a full twelve years of school.

The appropriate diploma, degree, or certification must be submitted to the Enrollment Department before any particular eligible Member within this age group may have his/her per capita payment mailed to him/her. If such copy is not submitted in a timely manner, the per capita payment for such Members shall be deposited in the Member's minor trust account.

Waséyabek Development Company Welcomes Jennifer Turner, Interim CEO

Waséyabek Development Company held a welcome reception on July 28 at FireKeepers Casino for newly selected Interim Chief Executive Officer Jennifer Turner.

Turner, a Michigan Native, brings 20 years of leadership and management experience to Waséyabek, with 13 years of Tribal business development expertise. Turner served in various business capacities for the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe before becoming CEO for Migizi Economic Development Corporation, their non-gaming economic diversification arm, where she spearheaded the \$45 million Soaring Eagle Water Park and Hotel project, along with an RV park.

Most recently, Turner served as CEO of Grand Canyon Resort Corporation (GCRC) for the Hualapai Tribal Nation in Arizona. During her tenure as CEO, Jennifer led the corporation to a record setting financial year and broke visitation records, largely achieved through innovative media platforms developed by Turner's team. She also led the Tribe and Corporation through a Master Plan development, and led the development of a community grocery store, gas station and a major renovation project to Grand Canyon West's Visitor Center. With Turner's guidance, GCRC developed their first leadership program designed to provide Hualapai Tribal Members opportunities to receive detailed education and workplace mentorship, promoting advancement opportunities within the Tribe and GCRC.

In brief statements made during the welcome event, Turner thanked NHBP for the honor and opportunity to serve the community as they pursue an economic diversification strategy. Truner has hit the ground running, and is currently leading the strategic planning efforts and Skasgé Power, LLC.

Waséyabek Development Company, LLC was formed last year to pursue economic diversification, to create jobs and revenue for the Tribal community. This model has been successfully utilized throughout Indian Country as a strategy for designing sustainable Tribal economies, guided by our seven generation beliefs.

We had a wonderful time this summer especially since we were able to partner with the Family Out Reach Center's Radcliff Programming and the L.A.U.N.C.H Program. The Tribal Youth Program would also like to give a Chi Migwéch to the NHBP Health Department for helping out with physical activities, nutrition teachings and organizing our healthy lunches.

During the Summer Day Camp Northern Youth were able to make their own bandolier bags to add to their regalia or their traditional bundles. Youth also visited the Jijak Foundation for a day of play and were able to participate in a clay pottery workshop with Frank Barker. Youth were given tobacco teachings and helped make tobacco ties for the NHBP Annual Pow Wow. In addition to receiving cultural teachings youth were also exposed to substance abuse prevention curriculum and exercise sessions.

The Membership Services Department was very pleased with the response received by the Grand Rapids Native Community as the numbers spoke volumes in showing the need for a Summer Program in Grand Rapids. We had a total of 43 youth signed up for this program, with an average of 25 youth attending weekly. We need to acknowledge our parents and grandparents who volunteered weekly to assure we had an acceptable adult to child ratio.

We would also like to thank the Youth Learn Workers who assisted with the Summer Day Camp Program. They assisted with serving lunch, set up and tear down, and helped our young ones with craft projects.

It has been a great summer and we are happy that so many youth were able to join us in our adventures we hope that we can keep the momentum going this fall.





Tribe to Tribe Walking Challenge

The 2015 Tribe to Tribe Walking Challenge concluded on July 5. Sponsored by Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan, the program spanned two months and challenged Tribes across Michigan to increase their physical activity. This program brought about friendly competition among the NHBP community as we worked together, striving for most total team miles logged. NHBP had a total of 65 people register to participate. Everyone did a great job logging their steps, turning their logs in on time, and staying committed to completing as many steps as possible to help our team. Way to stay motivated!

Tribal Member Andrea Rainer, who took 845,510 steps over the course of the nine weeks, led the NHBP female walkers. Those steps equaled over 422 total miles! She was followed by Dental Assistant Kendra Blaskowski who covered over 358 miles in 716,558 steps, and Dental Hygenist Heidi Heers who covered over 351 miles in 703,663 steps.

The NHBP men were led by Tribal Member Anthony Woodring who covered over 486 miles in 973,341 steps. He was followed by Dr. Chas Jensen who covered more than 424 miles in 849,555 steps, and Tribal Member Chris Rogers who covered more than 412 miles in 824,254 steps.

Dick's Sporting Goods gift cards were awarded to the first, second and third place winners for both men and women in the amounts of \$75, \$50 and \$25 respectively. Altogether, NHBP was able to cover 10,460 miles! To put that in perspective, that would allow us to travel from the Reservation to Los Angeles, California, and back just under 2.5 times! That is very impressive and we should be proud of our accomplishment!

The walking challenge team winners were announced at the Michigan Indian Family Olympics on July 17. NHBP came in third place for overall team miles, and received grant money from Blue Cross in the amount of \$2,000 dollars. Congratulations!




